Continents

World Oceans

Climate

Countries around the world have different climates. Climates can be sorted into the following zones: warm, cold (or polar), tropical and temperate. Countries near the equator tend to have a hotter climate. Different animals are better suited to living in countries with a particular climate.

It has around 44 countries, including England. About 740 million people live in Europe. It is the third largest continent in terms of population.

Some of these are made (or changed) by humans, others are natural (made by nature).




Continent Facts

<u>organiser at home</u>

Knowledge Organisers have some important information that you will need for your topic. Below are some ideas for how you can use your knowledge organiser at home.

- 1. Look up your key vocabulary using a dictionary to find out what each of the words mean and put them into sentences.

- 5. Write a quiz and answer- construct quiz questions from the information in the knowledge organiser and see if you can get a family member to take part.
